The Northern Territory has a young, active population and sports and recreational activities are very popular. Public swimming pools are very affordable (i.e. can be as little as \$6 entry for a single visit for adults and \$3 for students with a valid student card).

The Darwin Wave Pool and Recreation

Lagoon provides safe wave and swimming options at the Darwin Waterfront. Admission to the Darwin Wave Pool is \$8 for adults. The Recreation Lagoon is free and is patrolled by lifeguards from 9am - 6pm every day.

Darwin Waterfront provides free Yoga classes every Saturday morning at 8am during the dry season and Aqua Fit at the Wave Lagoon every Sunday at 8:30am during the wet season.

Alice Springs Town Council has excellent sporting facilities for a wide range of sports and activities, as well as an Aquatic and Leisure Centre.





Did you know?

The Territory is home to World Heritage-listed Kakadu National Park – it is one-third the size of Tasmania and nearly half the size of Switzerland.



Exploring the Territory

Litchfield National Park

Allow minimum 1 day

Litchfield National Park has all the essential waterfalls for swimming, military history, Aboriginal culture, comfortable camping, wildlife parks, fishing lodges and adventure attractions.

Douglas and Daly River region

Allow minimum 1 day

Located midway between Darwin and Katherine, the region is famous for fishing and hot springs, gorges, bushwalking and an abundance of wildlife.

Kakadu, Arnhem Land and Gove Peninsula

Allow minimum 2-3 days

Arnhem Land is made up of 91 000 square kilometres of unspoiled wilderness, located in the middle of Australia's northern coastline, bordered by Kakadu National Park, the Arafura Sea and the Gulf of Carpentaria. You will need a permit to visit Arnhem Land. The best way to travel is on a tour.

There's plenty to do in Kakadu. With a World Heritage-listed national park as your playground, the options are endless, and so are the views. Walk through a pristine wilderness brimming with wildlife or take a river cruise and spot the world's largest reptile.

Katherine region

Allow minimum 2 days

Three hours south of Darwin, Katherine has a vast network of rivers, escarpments and gorges that weave through sprawling plains of cattle stations, national parks and reserves.

Nitmiluk National Park, just 30km north-east of Katherine, covers a vast area, including 13 impressive gorges carved from the ancient sandstone country which stretch for as far as the eye can see.

Explore the world-famous park and gorge country on foot, by canoe, boat or helicopter.

Tennant Creek and Barkly region

Allow minimum 2 days

Tennant Creek is a friendly town on the main arterial road between Alice Springs and Darwin. Discover a rich history shaped by gold mining, Aboriginal culture and the Northern Territory's original cattle kings.

Nearby is Karlu Karlu/Devils Marbles Conservation Reserve, a geological marvel,

and the stone buildings of the Tennant Creek Telegraph Station, constructed in 1872 as a link in the Overland Telegraph Line to connect the outback with the rest of the world.

Alice Springs and surrounds

Allow minimum 4 days

While you're here, explore Alice Springs' rich and diverse art scene and intriguing outback history. Once you've set up a base in Alice Springs, discover what lies beyond as you head out into a diverse and fascinating region.

Uluru and surrounds

Allow minimum 4 days

One of the best ways to soak in the beauty of Uluru-Kata Tjuta National Park is to partake in one of a number of walks.

The Uluru-Kata Tjuta Cultural Centre is a great starting point for visitors to the park. Located 35 kilometres west of Uluru, walk through the rock domes of Kata Tjuta (The Olgas) to the Valley of the Winds lookout.

Only three hours from Uluru, Kings Canyon is a majestic destination featuring 100-metre high sandstone walls, palm-filled crevices and views that stretch across the desert.

More than just a day trip destination, explore the walking trails, four-wheel drive tracks, camel tours, the Lost City and the Garden of Eden. Accommodation options range from camping to resort-style rooms.

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Art and culture

The Territory is home to many different cultures. From ancient rock-art sites and Dreamtime stories, to contemporary galleries and outback charm, living in the Territory is full of cultural experiences.

Keep an eye out for the Territory Arts Trail as it connects regional and remote galleries across the Territory. You can find out where to take part in demonstrations and workshops or visit art galleries and national parks to see rock art, paintings and historical artefacts. Darwin hosts a vibrant performing arts scene with first-class contemporary acts in dance, theatre and music. If you need a break from your study, check out what is happening at the Darwin Entertainment Centre, Brown's Mart Theatre in Darwin city, or the Railway Club in the suburb of Parap.

The Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory is the Territory's premier cultural organisation – located on Larrakia land at Bulloky Point in Darwin. It is home to internationally renowned cultural and scientific collections and research and exhibition programs, plus meet Sweetheart the crocodile!

Alice Springs' hotspots for arts and culture are the Araluen Cultural Precinct and Watch This Space.

Art in the Top End is not just on the walls of galleries and museums; catering to our outdoor lifestyle, the canvas extends to the facades of buildings, fences, lanes and alleyways. Darwin and Katherine are home to an eclectic array of abstract, portrait and interpretive art installations featuring local, national and international artists.

Moving checklists

Pre-arrival checklist:

1. Visas (application, conditions, restrictions)

Ensure you have applied for and received your student visa.

2. Book flights

International flights are available into Darwin International Airport. If you are planning on studying in Alice Springs, you will need to book a domestic flight from Darwin (or another city in Australia).

3. Secure accommodation

Make sure you have accommodation confirmed before you arrive. Find out more about options in the accommodation section of this handbook.

4. Certificate of Enrolment (CoE)

Ensure you have received your CoE before you book your flights.

5. Purchase Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC)

International students must have an OSHC and maintain it throughout their study period.

6. Travel insurance

Ensure you have adequate travel insurance for your trip to Australia.

7. Airport transfer

Plan your transport from the airport to your accommodation when you first arrive.

8. Documents

Ensure you have important documents in digital format as well as printed format. Important documents include visa confirmation, CoE, passport, accommodation details and emergency contact details.

9. Notify your bank

It's a good idea to let your bank know that you are moving overseas and there will be transactions from another country.

Did you know?

Student interests are protected by the Education Services for Overseas Students Act (ESOS), which regulates education and training services.

All providers of education for international students must be registered with the Commonwealth Register of Institutions and Courses for Overseas Students (CRICOS). Each institution will have a provider number as evidence of current registration.





Post-arrival checklist

1. Arrange your Student ID card

Contact your education provider to arrange a Student ID. An ID can provide you with access to certain amenities, discounts and other services in the NT.

2. Set up your bank account

This is crucial if you're planning to work in Australia, but is also useful for paying rent and other expenses.

3. Apply for a Tax File Number (TFN)

You will need a TFN if you are planning to work in Australia. TFN is a unique number the Australian Tax Office creates and gives you to use for taxation and superannuation purposes. A TFN ensures you do not pay more tax than necessary.

4. Organise a phone or sim card

You can use your existing phone or buy one in Australia, with the option of going prepaid or signing up for a plan.

5. Know your emergency number

In case of an emergency and you need assistance – police, fire or ambulance – you can call Triple Zero (000). This number can be reached even without reception. Make sure to save this number in your phone.

6. Locate your nearest amenities and grocery store

When you've located your nearest grocery store and or desired facilities – use the service/stock up on basic ingredients and your favourite foods from home. Having foods you are familiar with will help if you're feeling homesick.

7. Plan your studies

Find out when classes start, where your campus is located (some institutions are spread across several campuses) and when orientation week kicks off.





Scholarships and Grants

The Northern Territory Government and education and training providers offer scholarships to talented international students to study in Australia's Northern Territory.

International students may also be eligible to access grants available to help with their move to the Northern Territory.

Accommodation options

We have a range of accommodation options for international students, including homestay, private rentals, purpose-built student accommodation and boarding facilities.

Factors to consider when selecting accommodation:

- how close is it to your education and training provider?
- what is nearby? (shops, parks, restaurants, public transport)
- does everything work?
- is the area safe and is the building secure?
- is it noisy?
- always confirm the total cost and any other expenses you may be required to pay, such as a bond and utility fees and ensure they are included in your accommodation agreement

Under 18's

International students under 18 years of age must have suitable accommodation and welfare arrangements while they are studying in Australia.



UniLodge

UniLodge is a purpose-built student accommodation facility located in the Casuarina shopping precinct in close proximity to the Charles Darwin University Casuarina campus and the Casuarina bus interchange. UniLodge is open to students studying with all education providers.



Accommodation options include self-contained, air-conditioned studios and shared apartments with modern study rooms and common areas. Shared facilities include:

- student lounge with large screen television
- high-level security with intercom, CCTV and swipe card access for all public areas of the building
- individual locks for apartments and rooms
- air-conditioning in all apartments
- barbecue area
- laundry (card-operated) and ironing facilities
- game area with pool table and table tennis
- large common kitchen and dining area.



On-campus accommodation at Charles Darwin University

Living at CDU Village Casuarina (formerly International House Darwin) places you into the heart of multicultural Darwin.

Boarding

Boarding facilities are available in Darwin at Haileybury Rendall School.

Private rental accommodation

You can rent or lease a property by yourself or with friends. This can be done through a real estate agent or privately. Living in a private rental is an excellent way to immerse yourself in Australian culture. To find shared accommodation, check noticeboards on campus, social media, or visit the Real Estate Institute of the Northern Territory, which lists more than thirty rental agencies.

Living in homestay

Living with a homestay family gives you the opportunity to learn about the Northern Territory lifestyle and improve your English language skills.

In homestay accommodation, you have your own bedroom and study desk and may share or have your own bathroom. The homestay family may provide some or all of your meals.

Homestay fees vary, depending on the meals and services provided. Homestay arrangements can include guardianship arrangements for students under 18 years of age. It can be for a few weeks when you first arrive, for a full year or longer.

Tenancy agreement

If you are renting a property through a real estate agent or landlord, you should be asked to sign a tenancy agreement.

This is a contract that will include agreements about how much rent you will pay and whether a bond is required. Read it through very carefully before you sign. You will also need to complete an entry condition report that shows any damage to the premises before you move in.

Legal protection

You are legally obliged to pay for your accommodation, cleaning and maintenance expenses on time. You also have the legal right to feel secure in your property, and to live in accommodation that is well maintained with working electricity and water.

If you have problems with your accommodation, talk to your real estate agent or landlord (if renting); your international student support staff for on-campus living or your homestay service providers. There is always someone who can help.

Did you know?

International students can access services that provide free legal advice if you're having tenancy problems i.e. Community Legal Services and NT Legal Aid.



Before you take out a lease on a property

- ensure you have enough money to cover the bond and any advanced rent
- arrange a reference or guarantor
- inspect the property before you sign a contract or pay a deposit
- photograph any existing damage or issues
- make sure you receive and keep a copy of your rental agreement and receive a receipt for all rent and bond payments
- pay attention to details regarding the end of your rental agreement

Tips

- Landlords and real estate agents will require references when you are applying for a property
- Always inspect the property before you sign the lease and pay
- Read the contract and make sure you understand it before you sign





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

Working in the Territory

As an international student working in Australia, you have the same protections as any Australian in the workplace. Here are some things you need to know.

Your pay

Australia has a minimum wage. You must be paid at least this amount – it's the law.

Paying tax

If you're working in Australia, you might need to pay tax depending on how much you earn. Get a Tax File Number (TFN) from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) before you begin working. Give your TFN to your employer to make sure you don't pay more tax than you should. You only need to apply for a TFN once – it is yours for life!

Depending on how much you earn during the year, you may be eligible for a tax refund. At the end of the financial year (which ends on 30 June each year) you must lodge a tax return to the ATO.

Payslips

In Australia, you must get a payslip within one working day of getting paid. Normally workers get paid weekly, fortnightly (every two weeks) or monthly. The payslip is an important document as it provides a record of hours worked, rate of pay, tax deducted and total amount earned.

Casual work

In Australia you will find many casual roles. In casual work, you don't have a fixed number of hours every week. The hourly rate of pay is usually higher because you don't get paid holidays or sick leave.

Did you know?

Charles Darwin University has ranked 8th in Australia for undergraduate student outcomes, with nearly 85% of students reaching full-time employment following graduation.

Work hours

Remember – as an international student on a sub-class 500 visa you can usually work up to 48 hours (from 1 July 2023) every two weeks during term time, and unlimited when your course is not in session. It is important you keep to this limit – it is what you agreed to when you were given your student visa. Work hour restrictions may be relaxed from time to time. It is important you remain informed by checking the Department of Home Affairs website.

Superannuation

If you work in Australia as an international student, you are entitled to superannuation – which is the Australian form of pension. Your employer is usually required by law to pay money into a superannuation or retirement savings account for you. Superannuation guarantee contributions must be at least 12%, (as of 1 July 2025) of your ordinary earnings. International students who have worked in Australia are eligible to access their contribution once they leave Australia permanently, by applying for a DASP (Departing Australia Superannuation Payment) through the ATO.

How to write a resume



Most employers request a resume with a job application. A resume is a written record of your education, skills and experience, and it should provide a summary of your work history, training and knowledge.

A well-written resume can increase your chances of gaining employment.

When writing your resume, ensure the layout is neat, simple and easy to read – the use of headings and dot points are helpful. Employers often have to read multiple job applications, so depending on your work history try to aim for a maximum of 2 pages.

Important information to include that employers will be looking for:

- contact details
- career strengths
- relevant employment history
- education and training achievements
- referees

If you need help writing a resume, there are various free templates available via Microsoft Word and online.



Many students find work in the Territory through less formal channels, such as checking electronic and other noticeboards, approaching businesses directly or by asking their friends and peers.

Workplace rights

Australia has strict laws relating to employment conditions. Everyone working in Australia has basic rights at work, including international students, such as:

- receiving a minimum wage
- protection from unfair treatment or dismissal
- breaks and rest periods during long working hours
- a healthy and safe work environment

Equal opportunities must be provided to all workers in Australia. It is illegal to disadvantage anyone in the workplace on the basis of race, religion, age, gender, marital status, sexual preference or disability.

Your employer can't cancel your visa, even if it's been breached; for example, you've worked beyond the 48 hours per fortnight that your visa allows. Only the Department of Home Affairs can grant, refuse or cancel visas.

The Fair Work Ombudsman website has lots of information, specifically for international students about their rights and responsibilities in the workplace. Visit fairwork.gov.au for more information.

Volunteering

Have you thought about volunteering? It's a great way to meet people, develop new skills and of course, help the local community. Volunteering experience is also a great inclusion in your resume. You can study in a Northern Territory Government school



Northern Territory Government schools offer international students a high-quality education with programs at three levels: Primary (Transition – Year 6), Middle (Year 7-9) and Senior Secondary (Year 10-12). The Northern Territory partners with South Australia to deliver the Northern Territory Certificate of Education and Training (NTCET) in Years 11 and 12.

Students will enjoy a small class size in a quality learning environment. Students are nurtured and guided through their education journey, with older students given the opportunity to engage in career development activities and receive advice from qualified careers counsellors, along with work placement opportunities.

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Money and banking

The Australian currency (AUD) is dollars (\$) and cents (c). One hundred cents equals one dollar. Notes come in \$100, \$50, \$20, \$10 and \$5 denominations. Coins are available as \$2, \$1, 50c, 20c, 10c and 5c denominations.

Overseas currency and travellers' cheques may be exchanged at most banks and foreign currency exchanges. Some large hotels will also exchange major currencies.

A range of banks and local credit unions operate in the Northern Territory. The four major banks in Australia are NAB, Commonwealth Bank, Westpac, and ANZ. Other banks in the Northern Territory include the People's Choice Credit Union, Bank of Queensland, BankSA and Bendigo Bank.

To open an account you need to have:

- your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCOE)
- proof of identification such as your passport, drivers licence, student ID card or bank card

You can access your money at automatic teller machines (ATMs), which are readily available throughout the Northern Territory. You may be charged a fee for using an ATM not associated with your own bank.

Some major supermarkets offer free withdrawals - no purchase required.

You should also be able to use your bank card from your home country at most ATMs, however, there will be additional fees.



Scams

A scam is any fraudulent, dishonest scheme designed to take your money or steal your identity.

Scams rely on you acting quickly so it's important to be aware and avoid acting impulsively and take your time to investigate the claim.

Protect yourself from scams:

1. Never give money, credit card details or online account details to anyone you don't know or trust
2. File your receipts
3. Check your bank account and credit card statements
4. Report any unexplained transactions to your bank
5. Keep your bank cards safe and secure your PIN numbers
6. Apply security programs to your devices

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Transport

Public transport

Bus transport operates in Darwin and Palmerston offering students travel concessions, and free travel for Territory primary and secondary school students.

Driving in the Northern Territory

Driving in Australia is on the left-hand side of the road – the same as Malaysia, Singapore and Indonesia – and the opposite to China, the Philippines and the United States of America, where driving is on the right-hand side of the road.

International and Australian drivers from other states can drive with an international or state licence but must apply for a Northern Territory Driver's Licence within three months of living in the Territory.

Hire cars and taxis

Taxis, hire cars and ridesharing services such as Uber are available in most major towns in the Territory.



E-scooters and E-bikes

E-scooters and e-bikes are a great option for commuters, providing a quick, environmentally friendly and inexpensive mode of transport to move around Darwin.

E-scooters and e-bikes operate in Darwin, the Waterfront, Cullen Bay, East Point and parts of the northern suburbs. E-scooters and e-bikes are considered as motor vehicles and all users must follow the road rules. You must be 18 years of age to hire one. Simply download the Beam- Escooter sharing app to your mobile device and then create an account.

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Health and wellbeing



Medical services are available throughout the Territory through public and private general practices, clinics and hospitals. To access the services you'll need to show you've got Overseas Student Health Cover.

Health services

Dentists, general medical practitioners, specialists and allied healthcare professionals such as physiotherapists, optometrists and pharmacists practice in major towns throughout the Territory. You usually need to make an appointment to see a general practitioner, dentist or other health professional. It is a good idea to check the cost when you make your appointment as fees can vary.

Sexual Health – Clinic 34

You can get contraceptive medications and devices very easily and cheaply in Australia. Clinic 34 is a specialist sexual health service that provides testing and treatment for sexually transmitted infections. All services are free and confidential and you do not need a Medicare Card.

Please remember that consent requires explicit permission for sexual activities from both parties. 'Maybe' is not consent and saying 'no' removes consent at any point.

Mental health support

Looking after your mental health is just as important as looking after your physical health and staying healthy will make your time studying even better!

Studying in a different language and living in a new country away from family and friends can be isolating and result in stress. A different culture and different expectations can create significant challenges. Stress can affect how you think and feel and may result in anxiety or depression.

If you think that you have no one to talk to and you are concerned about your mental health or that of someone close to you call the Northern Territory mental health line on 1800 682 288.

Also, check with your education provider – they are required to provide access to welfare-related services to assist with issues that may arise during your studies.

Common signs that can show you are under too much stress

- a loss of interest in hobbies or typical activities such as attending class
- difficulty sleeping
- emotional outbursts
- sudden weight gain or weight loss
- problems concentrating, remembering or thinking logically
- substance abuse
- excessive worrying
- symptoms of anxiety such as heart palpitations, headaches, hot flashes or chills, shaking or shortness of breath

Good mental health is a sense of wellbeing, confidence and self-esteem. It enables you to fully enjoy and appreciate other people in day-to-day life and your environment.

Tips for staying healthy

- talk about your feelings or situations that are worrying you
- keep in touch with friends and family
- practise your English to overcome communication barriers
- join community groups to connect to other people
- ask for support or help early
- eat well and keep active
- take a break and get plenty of sleep
- if you drink alcohol, make sure it is in moderation
- do things you enjoy
- accept who you are

The Territory has a range of phone and internet services. It is wise to purchase a SIM card and Australian mobile phone number when you arrive. You will have the choice of a prepaid or contract service.

Prepaid gives you flexibility because you can decide how much you want to spend and easily increase or top up the amount of credit. Specialised mobile phone shops, supermarkets and post offices sell mobile phones and prepaid phone credit. If you use your mobile phone a lot, a contract might be a better option than prepaid. You may also want to look at the mobile phone coverage provided under each contract. Providers offer data packages to accommodate your use of communication services.

Availability of internet services is similar to phone services in that you can choose prepaid or contract. Many internet providers in Australia also provide phone services.

The international dialling code from within Australia to other countries is 0011. You would dial 0011 + country code + area code + telephone number. To call Australia from overseas, dial +61 followed by the area code (dropping the zero from the front) and telephone number.

There are a number of free and paid streaming options available in Australia.



Tip
Free Wi-Fi is available at Darwin bus interchanges, on some Darwin buses, in public libraries, in malls, shopping centres and for students at all education providers.


